

**David Morgan**  
**b. 1862 d. 1937**

**X-ray pioneer**  
**Reformer of Medical Services at Sea.**

One of the pioneers of radiology in the UK, Morgan's work so badly damaged his hands that he had to give it up. He joined the Cunard Line in 1897 as Examining Officer based at Liverpool, with responsibility for all the emigrants and other passengers to America.

In 1910 he became medical superintendent and by introducing better equipment and more highly trained personnel, he greatly improved the standard of medical care at sea.

He worked for Cunard until he retired in 1926 and came to live in London.

Appropriately, the only wreath at his funeral was of blue and white flowers in the shape of the 'Blue Peter', the flag flown by a ship leaving port.

Morgan lived in Hampstead Way, NW11.
